


#### **School Rewards Trips**

### **Sports News**

#### Football

Football has always been extremely popular with fantastic attendance at our extra-curricular clubs which have seen both individual and team success. Individually, we must congratulate Jack Brookfield who this year secured his professional scholarship with Salford City. Our five football teams entered the Sefton Cup this year and our Year 10s progressed to the the semi-final against eventual winners, Maricourt. All of our teams progressed to the later rounds and although this year there was no Sefton Cup silverware, there were plenty of positive performances which suggests potential future success.

Once again, Stanley hosted the North Sefton schools football festivals. These festivals usually act as a qualifier to represent Sefton at Finch Farm, the home of Everton Football Club training ground. Our students this year not only went to the home of Everton, but to Liverpool FC. Our Year 7 & 8s had the chance to represent school at the North West Finals where our Year 8s finished 3rd overall.





#### Basketball

At Stanley, we have a great tradition of basketball success. This season was no different with our boys winning their respective competitions in Year 7, 8, 9. The success of our basketball teams means that now we will be linking up with Edge Hill University, who have kindly offered to host the basketball tournaments at their campus.

#### Glasgow trip - March 2025

This year we ran our first football trip to Glasgow.



During the trip, students were trained by members of the Celtic coaching team and had the opportunity to attend a tour of the stadium. They also attended a home fixture between Celtic and Hearts.

Students thoroughly enjoyed the occasion. Celtic needed the win to clinch the title and we were able to witness a 3-0 victory to Celtic. Our teams played against some strong local opposition and all of the games were evenly contested and played with a high level of sportsmanship throughout.

Special mention, however, goes to our Year 11 team on the final fixture on the final day who secured a win which meant the journey home was full of high spirits, despite the tired bodies after the busy week.

After the wonderful success of this trip, the PE department has already planned the next trip to Spain with 40 students from next years Year 9 & 10s who will be flying out in March 2026 to represent the school against continental opposition.





#### **Cross Country**

Throughout the year, Sefton have hosted three cross country races. One of the venues is our own Stanley High and students from Years 7, 8 and 9 have had both individual and team successes.

Through various inclement weather conditions, our students have shown great determination and have had top ten finishers in all of the year groups; however, the highlight of the cross-country season has to be when Stanley hosted 22 primary schools in May with approximately 1,100 pupils ranging from Years 3-6 taking part in the Sefton Primary School competition.

We had over 100 students acting as Sports Leaders performing marshalling duties, pacemaker duties and some students were attached to the different primaries helping to organise them.

Our students were truly remarkable ambassadors for our school and this allowed them to showcase all of their talents. Well done to all the students who helped and supported that day but also a massive thank you on behalf of the PE department to all of the sports leaders. They have supported all of the activities we have hosted at Stanley High School for our Primary Schools as well as the amount of curriculum days that are a regular part of our school calendar.



#### Cricket

Wow, what a year! The great British summer has seen rising temperatures which were only matched by the exemplary performances that our students have produced this season. In the local north Sefton cricket competitions that we play at Fleetwood Hesketh, Stanley were victorious in Years 7, 8, 9 & 10.

Our athletes competed very well on the day and, out of 20 schools, we finished 4th overall in Merseyside. The indoor athletics certainly gave a preview of the success we went on to have at the Southport and Formby Championships at Edge Hill and the Sefton Division 1 at Wavertree. In both of these competitions, Stanley secured both individual and team success.
