# Why create a revision timetable?

- To manage your time effectively (and avoid last minute cramming).
- To stop you feeling overwhelmed.
- To breakdown subjects into manageable topics.

# Steps to success

1. Plot your exams.
2. Work backwards to make sure you space your revision carefully.
3. Find out what each exam will cover and break the content down into smaller topics.
4. Allow more time to focus on topics that you are less confident with.

# The 2, 3, 5, 7 method (spaced revision)

1. Start from the date of your exam and plan a revision session the day before.
2. Two days before your last revision session, plan another one.
3. Count 3 days back from that and plan another session.
4. Count 5 days back and plan a session there.
5. Then count seven days back and plan your first revision session.

# Adapting to your needs

1. The 2,3,5,7 spaced revision method is just one framework to support your revision.
2. You can adjust the intervals based on the pace that works for you and the difficulty of the material.
3. If you are confident with the content of a topic, you can allow longer intervals between your revision sessions. You should keep the intervals shorter for more complex topics.
